

Martha Gonzalez, President-Elect of the Covington/Mandeville Branch



"My mother was an AAUW member off and on from her college graduation in 1951 to her death here in Mandeville in 2003. I remember as a child how excited she was that Title IX gave me opportunities in sports that she never had.

She taught me how important it was to vote, since as a resident of Washington, DC she was ineligible to vote in a Presidential election until the age of 31 when the 23rd amendment gave electoral votes to DC.

I was selected from my high school in Lander, Wyoming to receive a small scholarship for college from the local AAUW branch- the only scholarship I received.

I have been an AAUW member for close to 30 years. I have been a branch member of a California branch, New Orleans and Mandeville branches. I was President-elect, co-president, and then branch President 2005-2006. In spring 2006, my husband's job transferred us to The Netherlands for six years and then to eastern Russia for an additional five years. We returned home to Mandeville last October."
